# The Building of Group Efficiency: Rare Insight Offered By Stat Officer

#### **398TH BOMB GROUP STATISTICAL OFFICER**

Like most B-17 Bomb Groups at the time, the Cadre of the 398th Bomb Group attended the Army Air Force School of Applied Tactics in April 1943, at Orlando, Florida. As the Statistical Officer of the 401st Bomb Group, I attended the May 1943 class. On June 6, 1943, I was transferred to the 398th Bomb Group to fill their requirement for a second Statistical Officer. I succeeded Don Gawthrop as the Group Statistical Officer October 25, 1943. I remained as Group (and A.A.F. Sta. 131) Statistical Officer, until April 23, 1945, when I transferred to the 426th Service Group, to make it possible for our Assistant Statistical Officer, Andrew Holb to become a Captain.

The statistical section of the Army Air Force was set up to provide logistics and counselling to those in command. Col. Frank P. Hunter, Jr., (W.P. 1933) the Commanding Officer of the 398th Bomb Group, was quick to take advantage of all the help this offered.

#### **UP-TO-DATE INFORMATION**

In the Group Statistical Section, during training, we had a chart room in which we kept grafts, charts, and other displays up-to-date showing the status of training, personnel, material, and other factors in such a way that it was possible to keep pretty good track of what was going on in all facets of the Group and Squadrons. There were about 250 square feet of grafts, charts and other displays covering the four walls of the secret statistical room.

Every morning at about 7 A.M. Col. Hunter would come in to see what had happened the day before, and the status of matters in detail. He would usually stay about an hour, carefully going over each chart, graft, and display with us. Usually, we would have investigated to determine reasons or possible excuses for any unexpected or low showing, and could give him the benefit of that information.

Col. Hunter would then leave for his morning conference with the John G. Weibel (later Bruce Daily), Leo W. Killen, Peter J. Rooney, and Judson Gray of the 600th, 601st, 602nd, and 603rd respectively.

In about an hour, the squadron commanders would come into the statistical room wanting to know what the Colonel had seen to be able to pick out the good and weak spots in their training and squadrons. In many cases it was news to them. About half an hour after they left, their various squadron operations officers would appear on the scene for much of the same information.

#### CAUGHT UP WITH ROONEY

Since the value of the information was only as good as the figures being supplied us by certain squadron clerks, I (being a Kansas C.P.A.) expected that the figures would be jimmied somewhere along the line, and we kept a constant vigil against this probability. Sure enough, the 602nd's flying time figures didn't jibe with the tower by a significant amount on one occasion. The clerk, when confronted, stated that he had to follow orders. The squadron officer informed me that there was nothing that I would be able to do about it. Col. Hunter thought differently. He restricted "Pete" Rooney to the base for a solid week. Everyone got the message, that the only way to make a good showing was to produce. They really worked at it.

#### Did it pay off? Yes!

After completing training at the Rapid City Army Air Force Base, the 398th Bomb Group joined that Eighth Air Force at Station 131, near Nuthampstead, England. In the Eighth Air Force, when the Group started flying missions, a crewman generally had to fly 25 missions before he could return to the States. At that time, the losses were averaging about 3.3% of the B-17 crews being missing in action (MIA) or killed in action(KIA). That would have meant that about 17.5% of the crews would finish their missions. As the losses per mission dropped later, the number of required missions would be raised. A little at a time, the required missions rose to about 35. I was informed (off the record) that they tried to keep about a 79% average on MIA and KIAs (or, in other words, about 21% would finish their missions and return to the States).

NOTE: Capt. Campbell's casualty statistics, printed above, represent those of the original crews that trained at Rapid City. Final numbers show 75 killed; 275 missing; 195 PW; 32 escapees; 8 rescued at sea; and 44 liberated by Allied troops.

The first five months of combat, the Group's losses per mission, on the average, ran about .69 of 1%, while, we were informed, the Eighth Air Force losses ran about 2.69% per mission. After the first five months, the original crews had pretty much finished their tours, one way or another. It was the duty of the Statistical Section to investigate and give the official reports of all MIA's and KIA's for the air crew personnel. I kept fairly good track of all the original flying personnel that trained with the Group at Rapid City, South Dakota, until Germany was defeated. In some cases we heard that MIA's were POW or KIA's.

There was a rule in effect that when a Group led the Division, the Group Commander, Deputy Commander, Operations Officer, or a Squadron Commander had to fly in the lead plane. Col. Hunter set up a dial and required that each take the task in order, so there was no picking and choosing. I can remember the dread with which Col. Hunter, who was due next, faced that mission after the Division had lost four lead planes in a row.

There was a noticeable relief on his face as that next mission was scrubbed because of weather. Finally the day came, and he broke the jinx. Later, however, on January 23, 1945, his luck ran out, leading the Division on a raid to Neuss.

I believe that there were about 479 men who returned to the States to their families as a result of the leadership and dedication of the 398th Bomb Group's truly great leader, Col. Frank P. Hunter, Jr.

#### **COL. EARL BERRYHILL**

One of the many officers and men of the 398th who make their homes in the 1987 reunion city of San Antonio is Col. Earl Berryhill. The former group executive officer served not only with the 398th, being among the first members of the initial cadre unit in 1943, but had many other assignments during his 31-year Air Force career. Much of his service before and after WW II was in positions of training and education. He was a graduate of Texas A & M, and received masters and doctorate degrees at the University of Phillipines and University of Houston. He was on the faculty of The Citadel from 1965 to 1974 following his retirement from the Air Force.

Among the many others who call San Antonio "home" is Col. Lew Ensign, who succeeded Col. Frank Hunter following the latter's death on a bombing mission January 23, 1945.

## It Was TRENKLE On Beach Landing

The navigator on the Petersen-Lamb July 8, 1944 beach landing mission (FLAK NEWS, February) was Phil Trenkle, not Art Waarama as reported. A couple of "memory banks" failed in the reporting, and the editor apologizes for the error. Waarama, who died this year, had been shot down leading the group to Berlin on June 21.

The featured speaker July 25 will be the nationally known Management Development Specialist for U.S.A.A., Mr. Robert Gaylor.


