CASH FLOW SHORTAGE

"A serious event is overtaking us. An analysis of 398th Treasury cash flow shows we may run out of a operating funds before the year is out. This will cause serious difficulties, like not being able to issue a FLAK NEWS. This dollar shortage is due to a combination of many events. We are slowly losing members due to death; loyal membership dues-paying has fallen off sharply; many "members" are neglecting to pay dues altogether; and the costs of our operation, such as those to print and mail the FLAK NEWS, continue to increase.

The \$10 annual due fee no longer covers publishing costs. I thank you for supporting our recent special projects in fine style, BUT it is time for many to "catch up" on their dues paying, and for longtime 398th life members to consider a special FLAK NEWS support contribution. 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WHO CAN COUNT THE TEARS?

Emotions Overflow in England, Czech Republic

daughters ... and veterans ... cast eyes on the window bearing the names of loved ones killed in action? Who was able to measure the stir of emotions as the Duke of Gloucester unveiled the window in the company of the Bishop of St. Albans, 398th president Wally Blackwell, Friends chairman Wilfrid Dimsdale, church warden Sir Roger duBoulay, Rector Gerald Drew, and the builders of the window, Patrick and John Rentiens?

The Bishop, Rt. Rev. Christopher Herbert, had set the stage from the lofty and ancient pulpit with a simple, yet powerful message, ending with the words, "the narrow path leads to Christ."

The Duke of Gloucester paid tribute to the 398th men who died, their names now etched in the glass that he would then unveil. At that point the Bishop said—

"I dedicate this window to the glory of God."

To be sure, it was a day to remember. And yet, only one of many days to remember as the tour members and their English Friends of the 398th laid down flowers at the base of their Memorial and heard the names of each and every man who perished read loud and clear to the assemblage by Blackwell, Conrad Samuelson and Peggy Wells.

All that, and a day at Cambridge American Military Cemetery, where no less than seven widows of 398th men presented a floral wreath at the Memorial — Dorothy Borchers, Jeanne Stange, Mary Ludlam, Jean Madlung, Gertrude Wells Neff, Eleanor Siegenthaler and Mary Allen.

All that, and more, and the Year 2000 Tour was only half over.

Yet to come were visits to such world class cities as Prague, Pilsen, Copenhagen, and...

Litice, Slany, Kovarska, Lidice, Karlovy Vary, Marianske Lazne. The Czech Republic opened its

arms to the 398th, as it had done on a previous tour visit in 1995. Over 55 Czech cities have and maintain memorials to Americans killed in WWII.

The Allan Ferguson 602 B-17 went down near Litice on the Last Mission (April 25, 1945) and a memorial is there, huddled in the middle of the small community, honoring that crew and others who were killed nearby in crashes or by their German canters.

Jaromir Kohout of Pilsen combined with the surviving members of the Ferguson crew to add a special "desk" to the glass memorial. This plaque bears the names of those who were killed— Ferguson, John Halbert, Howard Feldman, Joseph Huestess, Michael Brennan and Byron Young.

Mayor Karel Dezort welcomed the U.S. visitors amid the strains of the Czech and American national anthems. Tour leader Allen Ostrom presented him with a 398th china plate, courtesy Joe Joseph's PX.



Pär Nilhammer, the Swedish tour guide who speaks five languages and works for Destination Europe of Luxembourg, said—

"If I have the opportunity I will bring other tour parties to this place just to show them what you Americans did in World War II and how the Czechs have chosen to honor your deeds."

And that was only one of several memorable stops in the Czech lands.

The Donald Christiansen 603 crew went down at Slany after a mission near Leipzig on March 2, 1945. The lone survivor was tail gunner Selmer Haakenson. The City of Slany built a

beautiful memorial there in 1996.

And it was "re-dedicated" on June 17, 2000 in the presence of the 398th tour party, several city officials, Czech Army and Air Force and an honor guard that stood at attention for an hour during the ceremonies.

Said their commanding officer—

"Those boys competed for the honor of serving at this ceremony."

Along with Christensen, the others killed on his crew were William Love, Harry Ostrow, John Gustafson, Robert Dudley, Elmer Gurba, Albert Carlisle and Kenneth Plantz.

A framed picture of the 398th logo, "Clearing and Colder," was presented to the deputy mayor. Inscribed on the picture were the words, "THANK YOU SLANY" next to an American flag; and in Czech, the words, "THANK YOU TO THE PEOPLE OF SLANY FOR ERECTING A MEMORIAL FOR OUR FALLEN COMRADES."

Slany just happens to be the hometown of Jaromir Jagr, a National Hockey League star with the Pittsburgh Penguins. A "JAGR" uniform shirt was presented to tour leader Ostrom by Jagr Fan Club president Milan Spineta, who also acted as ceremonial organizer.

Several gifts earmarked for Haakenson, who was not on the tour, were received by Ostrom, who promised to deliver them to the surviving tail gunner in Sacramento, California.

Ostrom, in receiving the gifts, told the Czech hosts—

"Look into our eyes and see the love and affection we Americans have for you."

A fantastic flying display was put on by Martin Stahalik, a two-time world aerobatic champion, also a Slany resident.

And yet, there was more.

Kovarska is not a world renowned city, even if located in the ski mountains on the Czech-German border. But it is the home of Jan Zdiarsky, who at the age of 12 decided to build a museum dedicated to the great air battles that took place over his city in WWII. And he did it. Rector Had A Day To Remember

The happiest man at the Anstey church window dedication must have been Rector Gerald Drew, who for years had preached in the modestly attended St. George church.

And who also holds the title of "Incumbent of the United Benefice of Anstey, Brent Pelham, Meesden and Hormeads with Wyddial." Most of these churches are hidden away among the wheat fields of Hertfordshire.

On June 11, 2000, only months away from his official retirement, Rev. Drew welcomed not only British royalty, the Duke of Gloucester, The Lord Bishop of St. Albans and two busloads of Yanks, but also over 400 more who came from far and near to celebrate the window dedication.

Rev. Drew did not wear his 603 Squadron cap for the occasion, but it is rumored that he did wear his 398th T-shirt under his church vestments.

And one may be certain that he insisted that the Royston Band conclude the musical ceremonies with a rousing rendition of "Dixie." This is in respect to Mrs. Frank P. Hunter, Jr., widow of the late commanding officer of the 398th.

YEAR 2000 TOUR ITEM:

The Army Attache Had It Right

The Army attache at the U.S. Embassy in Prague, Lt. Col. Scott Salyers, was a Civic Institute guest at the "Prague Mission Seminar" conducted by 398th tour members at the Monestary (the church that was bombed in error on February 14, 1945).

There were many questions posed by the Czechs in attendance. One had to do with the weather on that date. "Could weather have played a part in the mission?"

Col. Salyers immediately volunteered an answer--

"Whether on the ground or in the air, weather always plays a part in war."

The colonel did not know that winds of 100 miles per hour did indeed contribute to sending the group off course that day. (Not to mention malfunctioning radar navigation equipment).

A young American couple visiting the Monestary came into the seminar room and listened to the discussions. Upon leaving as the session broke up, they told the 398th members--

"That was a wonderful presentation. Thank you."

found in the area. He joined with Jaromir Kohout of Pilsen and the two created an air museum worthy of any city, anywhere.

Kohout is a welding instructor at the Pilsen Skoda Works and Zdiarsky is a computer graphic artist (and working toward a PhD in water management).

An older man drove two hours to Kovarska to meet with the 398th, there to present his own designed plaque containing a 50 caliber bullet and a B-17 "rate of climb" indicator. These, he said through interpreter Zdiarsky, came from the Christensen plane downed at Slany. Ostrom said he would personally deliver them to Haakenson.

A beautiful "Memory Document" bearing the 398th "Hell from Heaven" logo was presented to each veteran at the Kovarska museum courtesy mayor Milan Duhan and Zdiarsky. The certificate carried the words, "Please accept our best thanks for your duty to our Freedom in WWII."

In exiting Slany on the way back to Pilsen, tour guide Nilhammer detoured the coach to the small city of Lidice, where he told the story of how the Nazis had methodically murdered every citizen and burned the city to the ground in 1942.

This, they claimed, was in retaliation for some Lidice members' participation in the assassination of Heinrich Heydrich, the Nazi's "protector" of Czechoslovakia following the German invasion of 1939. He was known as "Hangman Heydrich."

An additional chapter to this story was seen at a church in Prague, where other Czech Resistance and British intelligence soldiers involved in the assassination had held out against the Germans. They ultimately took their own lives rather

than surrender.

While many members of the tour opted for major shopping in Prague, another group accepted an invitation from Prague's "Civic Institute" to hold a seminar in the very church that was hit by 398th bombs on February 14, 1945. (The target was Dresden, Germany).

Keith Anderson, John Cosco, David Mills and Ostrom took part in the presentation, which was media covered by Radio Free Europe and three Czech television stations.

A book containing mission information, photos and letters from several key members who were on the mission, was presented to the Civic Institute.

The monestary prior, Herr Englehardt (former German anti-aircraft gunner) smilingly posed the question, "Why us?"

Along with other details, the seminar included "Murphy's Law" as the principal reason for missing a target by 75 miles.

On the subject of "targets," Mills was the recipient of a wine-in-the-lap episode at the Hotel School in Marianske Lazne. Students preparing for careers in the hotel industry served the luncheon under the supervision of director Jiri Chum.

One student, Pavel Mach, dropped the wine in Mills' lap in full view of the stern-faced director.


"The boy looked crushed, like his career was over," said Mills.

After the luncheon, Mills gave the stillshocked Pavel his 1945 398th identity card and an autographed air combat photo, signed—

"You would have made a good bombardier"

"I think we saved his career," said Mills (who struggled through two days in Cambridge without his luggage).

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Cherie Ross was among the many 398th tour folks mingling with the English "re-enactment group" members gathered around the B-17 at the American Air Museum at Duxford,

England last June.

The "re-enactment" men (and women) were dressed in the US air combat dress of WWII, some wearing flak jackets, oxygen masks, fleece jackets, etc.

"That's how we looked in those days," was a common comment as the ex-airmen pointed to the young, trim Brits modeling the ancient gear.

A man picked up a chest (parachute) pack from the floor and handed it to the startled Cherie Ross. She looked at it for a brief moment and said —

"My God, that's the parachute that saved my Dad's life."

Later that same day, Cherie, her brother Randy, sister Nancy and mother Jean raised the late Jack Madung's flag in his memory on the tall pole "out there by the old tower."


These were followed by floral presentations honoring the memories of the 603 squadron men killed in the crash of their B-17 near the city in 1945.


Came a quick response



NO MORE: Gunner's Memories Still Linger

The Eighth Air Force said It has never been done before But we will bomb in daylight To help shorten the war

So high in the skies over Germany They would see us coming And that was the start Of broad daylight precision bombing

High in the skies over Germany The 398th Bomb Group flew In B-17 Flying Fortresses Ten men to each crew

In the early hours of the morning The wake up call came Come on guys, wake up You're going back up for more of the same

We hurried to breakfast Hoping for fresh eggs and ham But always settled for the standby Powdered eggs and Spam

Then came the briefing
That you hoped they wouldn't say
That dreaded Merseburg Germany
Was the target for today

The curtain on the map is drawn And you hear the briefing officer say Yes, gentlemen, Merseburg Germany Is the target for today

But Merseburg, Berlin or Dresden It really didn't matter where We knew the Flak and Luftwaffe Were always waiting for us there

Pick up your Mae-West Flak jacket and heated suit But most of all don't forget your beloved parachute

With four engines roaring You take off down the runway With the hope and prayers You'll come back one more day

For good luck you carry A four leaf clover And as you climb higher You lose sight of the White Cliffs of Dover

We flew in tight formations Leaving contrails behind Even tho we were five miles high We were not too hard to find

You keep flying forward In temperatures of 40 and 50 below Knowing that for mission completed There are still eight hours to go

While on the bomb run No evasive action or sway Just keep flying straight on course Until it is bombs away

The flak is so heavy That it blots out the sun But you keep flying forward Until you complete your bomb run After bombs away
Your mission is only half over
And your next goal is
To again sight the White Cliffs of Dover

Then came the Foche Wolfs and Messerschmitts At eleven and twelve o'clock high With all their guns blazing Trying to knock us down from the sky

You see a Flying Fort Going down on the right But no parachutes seen As it disappears out of sight

You see another Fort Burst out into flames With the pilot desperately trying To control his plane

Come on guys bail out Before its too late Then a thunderous explosion Sending one more crew to its fate

We couldn't get away from the Flak No matter how hard we tried But at 30,000 feet high There is no place to hide

Tired and weary
You return to your base
And your faithful ground crew
Who gives you one more embrace

One more successful landing
One more day alive
One more completed mission
Help me Lord, to complete twenty five

A shot of Scotch and interogation Would end our long day But weather permitting We would go up again the next day

The skies over Germany
Are now peaceful and serene
Gone are the B-17 bomber formations
Never again to be seen

No more contrails Decorating the sky No more Foche Wolfs and Messerschmitts At twelve o'clock high

No more flying in temperatures Of 40 and 50 below No more sweating out missions Of 8 or 9 hours to go

No more Flying Forts Going down in flames No more counting of parachutes Leaving their plane

No more Flak litters The sky No more devastation From high in the sky

No more bombing runs To the Ruhr Valley Where the Flak was so heavy We called it Flak Alley No more sweating it out Till you see your Bomb load No more seeing Forts Burning up and explode

No more P.F.F. planes Scattering tin foil in the sky No more ME 109s Coming in on the sly

No more scanning the sky No more waiting in vain For that one more plane That never came

No more Flak fills the skies That we had to fly thru But there was no turning back So that's what we had to do

No more crossing over The treacherous frigid North Sea No more bombing the V-2 rockets At Peenemunde

No more sweating out your last mission Hoping it's a so called milk run No more waiting for the Luftewaffe To come out of the sun

Memories and ghosts Are all that remain Of those hard fought battles in the sky Battles, never to be seen again

"No More" Author Found In L.A.

The poem, "No More," came to the FLAK NEWS office anonymously. The only clue was the postmark, "Los Angeles."

With a bit of research, the search narrowed to some veteran air crew member who had seen a lot of war.

Narrowing the search further, the name, "Pazquel Marquez" appeared as the likely poet "culprit."

Confronted with the "evidence," Marquez admitted to being the "anonymous" writer of "No More," and gave his permission to publish his poem in FLAK NEWS.

Marquez' credentials as a 398th air gunner were not come by easily, but rather via the long haul and with elite crews. He was a tail gunner on the 600 Squadron Gene Douglas crew, occasionally giving up his seat to a pilot-officer when Col. Frank P. Hunter was aboard as group/wing/division leader. He completed 28 missions.

Marquez was one of the very first enlisted

men to join the 398th after graduating from the Laredo, TX Gunnery School and subsequent assignments at Salt Lake, UT; Blythe, CA; Orlando, FL; Ephrata, WA; Spokane, WA and Rapid City, ND. He hooked up with the pilot Gene Douglas in Ephrata and was with him until Douglas went down over Misburg in November, 1944, flying as group commander with the Charles Zimmer crew.

He finished up his tour with Keith Ander-

He finished up his tour with Keith Anderson, who took over Douglas' crew.

Marquez, who had "been there, done that," with the 398th, came home to Los Angeles and never set foot in an airplane again.

Among the other air crew members that Marquez flew with during his stint were Bruce Daily, 600 Squadron CO; Harry Nelson, Tony Adams, Gil Goldman, Ken Shutts, Noel Callihan, Jim Basham, Art Ward, and Alfred Burke.

So instead of England, Czech Republic and Denmark, Charles spent his tour time in a hospital.

"When's the next tour?" he asked.

Year 2000 Tour Item:

She Still Has An Eye For Pilots

Czech pilot Martin Stahalik had just landed his Russian built aerobatic plane at the Slany, Czech Republic airfield in preparation for a performance honoring the 398th tour visitors.

Noting the pilot as he emerged from the cockpit, the eighty-something wife of retired Czech RAF Spitfire pilot Gen. Maj. Frantisek Perina (14 WWII kills) motioned to her 86-year-old husband and said--

"Never mind the plane. I want to meet that good-looking pilot."

Muspratt, Penn Vicar, Dead at 93

Rev. Oscar Muspratt, former vicar of Penn Church, Buckinghamshire, England, died March 8, 2000, at the age of 93.

While only one of many, many vicars to serve the Penn Church during its 900 year history, Rev. Muspratt will be remembered as the one who went directly to Gen. Jimmy Doolittle at 8th Air Force Headquarters to seek names.

These would be the names of the nine members of a 398th crew that perished near his church in 1944. He wanted to honor the men and to write to their relatives in the United States. Gen. Doolittle obliged and Rev. Muspratt followed through not only with the letters, but also had their names inscribed on the church's "Book of Honour."

In 1990, the 398th Tour to England and Scotland visited Penn, and Rev. Muspratt, and saw not only the venerable book, but also a row of American flags representing each of the deceased crew members. The tour also took in the very location where Charles Searl's B-17 and crew crashed at a place known as Lude Farm.

Ron Setter was a boy of 12 living on the farm at the time and he vividly recalled being thrown from his bed when the plane and all its bombs exploded some two hundred yards from his home.

Ron, Peter Halliday and Johanna Sienkiewicz combined to arrange for the 398th travel party to visit Penn. They were part of the Chiltern Historical Aircraft Preservation Group, and combined to do the research on the Searl crash.

Rev. Muspratt, the 55th in an ecclesiastical lineage dating back to 1349, connected the little town of Penn with William Penn, founder of the state of Pennsylvania. He wrote —

"If the Tomahawk Warriors (name of the Searl B-17) perished defending a church and a parish descended from a founder of the great democracy which, at the time America was itself defending in war, then, don't you see, the Tomahawk Warriors sacrificed their lives defending an American shrine.

"My church was the shrine, right here, in the hinterland of England."

Year 2000 Tour Item:

A Travel Coup

A Tip of the 398th Tour Cap has to go to travel consultant Barbara Fish, who managed to get 105 members to England on time despite having to ticket them from nine different US cities, one from Canada, and one from Moscow. And all the time making connections in four different European airports.
