The Ditching

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Ditching In North Sea Recalled By 398th Crew

The dramatic front/back aviation "ditching" art on the December issue of *8th Airforce News* brought back stark memories to the Howard Pinner crew of the 603rd Squadron who ditched their B-17 in the North Sea on January 1, 1945.

The ditching art is also included in the book, *Gil Cohen, Aviation Artist.* Cohen has long been identified with 8th Air Force history, and his work has been previously published in FLAK NEWS.

Pinner, his co-pilot, Leonard Tebbs, and engineer-gunner Niilo Isaacson are "still around" to recall spending New Year's Day, 65 years ago, drifting in the North Sea.

Also clinging to life in the lone life raft were William Jordan, bombardier; James Schofield, radio operator; and Elbert Huey, ball turret. All three are on the current Taps list.

Killed in the watery crash were navigator Warren King, waist gunner John Furrow and tail gunner Glen Cline.

Pinner and Tebbs each received the Distinguished Flying Cross for their flying (and ditching) skills.

398th Can Check Registry Web Site

I wish to bring to the attention of all our members, "The World War II Registry of Remembrances." This is a web site that combines four distinct databases that can be searched for names of those whose service and sacrifice helped win World War II.

The web site is *www.wwiimemorial.com*.

The databases are:

- 1. Buried in American Battle Monuments Commission (ABMC) overseas military cemeteries.
- 2. Memorialized on ABMC Tablets of the Missing.
- 3. Listed on official War and Navy Department Killed in Service rosters now held by the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA).
- 4. Honored by public enrollment in the Registry of Remembrances.

The Registry is operated in connection with the World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C. The Memorial honors the 16 million who served in the Armed forces and the more than 400,000 who died; and all who supported the war effort.

Any citizen who helped win the war, whether a veteran or someone on the home front is eligible for the Registry. The web site can be used to search for veterans names or add to the Registry the name of a loved one who contributed to the war effort.

Ditching In North Sea Recalled By 398th Crew

New Year's Day in 1945 started on schedule with the group heading in a north easterly direction over the North Sea with an ultimate mid-day rendezvous over the German city of Kassel.

Bill Markley of the 600th led the group, followed by Howard Rehme in the 603rd Low Squadron and Merwin Genung of the 601st in the High.

At about 5,000 feet and 150 miles from land, a fire broke out in Pinner's No. 2 engine, with flames stretching 20 feet beyond the wing. Feathering didn't help and neither did the extinguishers.

"Then I tried diving at excessive speed," said the pilot. "Still no luck. So we readied for ditching."

Pinner and Tebbs sent the other crew members to the radio room and quickly the B-17 settled into the waves in what the crew described as a "letter perfect ditching."

Raft Forcibly Freed By Co-Pilot

The "perfection" didn't include the Fortress, however. The plane broke open at the bomb bay and the North Sea immediately rushed in as the crewmen scrambled to exit out the radio room hatch. Farrow and Cline were engulfed by the water as they popped out. Cline did surface later, but could not reach the lone raft that had been freed by Tebbs.

Navigator King had bailed out from the front hatch as the engine fire raged. He was lost at sea.

Before Isaacson could escape through the break in the waist he pulled the release handles in the radio room to eject the two rubber life rafts which were housed in the upper reaches of the adjoining bomb bay. They should have released, filled automatically with air and deposited on each wing, tethered by a rope. The doors opened but the rafts did not release.

Tebbs, who exited from the cockpit on the right side, moved through the water to the still floating B-17 and pulled at the "stuck" raft. It released and the six crew members climbed aboard. This would include Tebbs, Pinner, Isaacson, Jordan, Schofield and Huey. They tried, but failed to reach Cline before he disappeared under the waves.

The raft on the port side went down with the plane, which sank in minutes.

Gibson Girl SOS Brought Help

The six floated for several hours with Schofield, the radio operator, working diligently on the Gibson Girl transmitter sending out SOS signals. Isaacson had retrieved the transmitter as it floated in the water.

Soon three P-47's came by and dropped smoke flares to mark their position and later another P-47 dropped a Lindholm rescue dinghy. Shortly before dark an RAF Lancaster dropped a "Flying Ditchman" lifeboat via parachute. All found the lifelines and "jumped" in. Soon a British launch found them and took them to England and ... finally back to Nuthampstead. (The story appears in the 398th book, "Remembrances.")

Since the end of the war the crew met on many occasions at each others' homes or at a 398th reunion.

Shortage Of Vets On England, Czech Tour

To no one's surprise, the "veteran" class on the June 2010 Tour to Europe is on the diminished side.

After all, it has been 65 years since the gladiators of World War II witnessed their last "flak attack." Thus it is up to the second and third generations to "show the flag" in the Czech Republic and England.

Terrance St. Louis will be the lone veteran flag carrier when he and 12 others arrive in the country that witnessed the final 398th Bomb Group mission, that coming on April 25, 1945, to Pilsen. St. Louis was the ball turret gunner on the Jim Koenig crew of the 600th Squadron.

He will be accompanied by his wife, Lydia; Don Christiansen, his son, Jeff, and brother Steve. It was Christiansens' father, Donald, whose B-17 was shot down by German fighters and crashed at Slany. A memorial ceremony will be held there.

Others heading for the CZ activities are Karen Neff, the 398th secretary, Frank Evola, Ken Howard, Will Mayhall and his wife, Linda Foell; Elaine Tyler and Richard Harris of England and, of course, the tour leader, Ann Collins. It was Ann who organized and assembled the 2010 Tour.

Mayhall's father was the navigator on the Harold Spangler crew of the 603rd and recently contributed \$5,000 to the 398th for the *Timeless Voices* program.

Lew Burke, one of the 398th Directors and co-pilot on the 603 Joe Alwood crew, plus Ted Johnston, 600 pilot, will be the two veterans going to England.

Others are Lew's wife, Lillie; Ted's Seattle friend, Gary Crocker; Teedy, John and Liz Blackwell; plus Neff, Evola and, of course, Ann Collins. Teedy plans to spread some of her late husband's ashes at Station 131.

Malcolm Osborn has been at work arranging a busy program for the Nuthampstead visitors, and has promised "something never seen before" at the Memorial ceremony.

The 131 gathering will be "augmented" by Marilyn and Geoff Rice, who last year took their 398th "presidency" from Colorado Springs, Colorado, to England. The CZ tour is from June 9 through June 13; the England tour is from June 14 through June 20.

New Book:

"Focus" Tells The Story Of Station 131

The aura and mystique that was "Station 131" some 65-plus years ago remains just that in the year 2010.

Nuthampstead's fascinating transformation from a sleepy farming village to a World War II fighter/bomber base is a story captured in an English-published soft cover book called "Airfield Focus," an ongoing project that intends to cover the history of all the airfield, aerodromes and airports within the U.K.

"Airfield Focus 82: Nuthampstead" is the latest in this endeavor by Graham Simons and co-authored by the 398th's own Malcolm Osborn, whose contribution features many photographs and local history. "Ozzie" has been "at this" since he and the late Vic Jenkins combined to form the "Nuthampstead Airfield Research Society" that ultimately lead to the building of the Memorial adjacent to the Woodman Inn.

The "Focus" book includes the 398th history, featuring stories and photos by Ozzie and USAAF, and also the story of the first tenant of Station 131, the P-38 fighters of the 55th Fighter Group.

Much of the "non combat" history features the construction of the three runways in 1942-43 by 814th and 830th U.S. Engineer (Aviation) Battalions and 346th Engineer Regiment. The staggering amount of material required for the airfield, the (then) accompanying "state of the art" paving machines and equipment, and accompanying battles with rain and mud, is a tribute to the men who did the work — mostly African-Americans.

Also, to be available to all returning veterans and to be a "centerfold" for B-17 reunions.

It can be assumed that "one day" the 398th will make a return trip to the Mighty Eighth Museum.

Fortresses of The World

The Aluminum Overcast, one of the very few B-17's that tours the United States and carries the World War II air war story to many thousands of visitors, is among the 13 B-17's still flying in the world today.

The total number of Fortresses is 50, made up of those flying, on display, in restoration, or in storage. All these are listed on Pages 8 and 9.

The list, along with serial numbers and brief history, has been compiled by "B-17 Co-op" of Alvin, Texas, headed by Tommy Garcia.

The B-17's Of The World Today 13 Flying, But More In Restoration

Once upon a time the skies were filled with a thousand and more B-17's, all dedicated to a single mission — the defeat of those nations seeking to dominate the world.

Since "those days" of World War II it has been left to a dedicated few to keep the Fortress memory alive. And up front among the "dedicated few" are those associated with "B-17 Co-op" and its tireless and determined leader, Tommy Garcia of Alvin, Texas.

Garcia is a "second generation" B-17 fan who somehow finds the time to keep tabs on all of the world's remaining B-17's, the remnants of those by-gone days.

The Co-op is a voluntary, informal association of persons directly involved with the restoration and preservation of B-17

aircraft. They are dedicated to the accurate preservation of these airccraft and the education of succeeding generations.

All time and materials used are donated in the interest of this cooperative approach to accomplish the collective and individual missions.

Garcia reports that there are 48 B-17's on the current list either flying, on static display, under restoration or reposing somewhere in the world in various parts and pieces.

"Movie" Memphis Belle (44-83546) Geneseo, NY. 91st BG. Military Air Restoration Corp. Restored as 8th AF B-17F, working bomb system, Norden bombsight with auto-pilot link.

Sally B (44-85784) Duxford Airfield, England. 91st BG. B-17 Preservation Ltd.. Flies as a memorial to the 79,000 U.S. airmen who lost their lives in Europe in WW II. Arrived in England from France in 1975.

Sentimental Journey (44-83514) Mesa, AZ. 457th BG. CAF, Arizona Wing. Was converted to a fire bomber after WW II and back to military configuration in 1980.

Texas Raiders (44-83872) Houston & Midland, TX. 381st BG. CAF, Gulf Coast Wing. Ex-Navy PB-1W 77235 used in aerial mapping of North Sea. Used for Gen. LeMay's retirement.

The Pink Lady (44-8846) St. Yan Airport, France. 351st BG. Forteresse Toujours Volante. This aircraft is flown approximately 50 hours per year air shows and commemoration ceremonies with American veterans.

Thunderbird (44-85718) Galveston, TX. 303rd BG. Lone Star Flight Museum. Flown from France to USA

Yankee Lady (44-85829) Belleville, MI. 381st BG. Yankee Air Force.

(No name) (44-85583) Base Area De Recife, Brazil. unknown. Forca Area Brasilia. Former SB-17G (search & rescue), became gate guardian at Brazilian airbase. **Boeing Bee** (42-29782) Museum of Flight, Seattle, WA. 91st BG, Olive Drab.

Bomber Gas Station (44-85790) Portland, OR. N/A. Bomber Complex, Inc. Punky Scott is Art Lacey's daughter.

Evergreen Int'l Aviation (44-83785) McMinnville, OR. 490th BG. Evergreen Aviation Museum. Formerly rigged with 'sky hook' and other secrets. Involved in Project 'Cold Feet'. Aircraft was flying and may again someday. Used in James Bond movie.

Gremlins Hideout (44-83863) Eglin AFB, Florida. 388th BG. USAF Armament Museum. A Navy PB-1W Airborne Early Warning (AWACS). Restored as bomber.

Heaven's Above (44-83512) Lackland AFB, Texas. 457th BG. USAF History & Tradition Museum.

Home Sick Angel (42-3374) Offut AFB, Nebraska. 388th BG. U.S.A.F.. Gate Guard, SAC HQ, Offut AFB, Painted as 42-30230

I'll Be Around (44-85828) Pima Air Museum, Tucson, Az. 390th BG. 390th Memorial Museum. Last B-17 retired from Government service.

Mary Alice (44-83735) Duxford, England. 401st BG. Imperial War Museum & American Air Museum. Used world-wide as executive transport. Retired to War Museum in 1975. Flown to England from France.

Miss Liberty Belle (44-83690) Grissom ARB, Indiana. 305th BG. Grissom Air Base Museum. Original Miss Liberty Bell 42-31255 crash landed in England in 1944.

Picadilly Princess (44-83542) Polk City, FL. unknown. Fantasy of Flight. Former drone (DB-17G) used in weapons testing.

Preston's Pride (44-85738) Tulare, CA. 379th BG. American Veterans Memorial. Was a 'Mother' to 'Baby' drones used to gather radioactive samples at Eniwetok. Aircraft operator Amvets Post No.56. Last USAF service aircraft used as VIP transport.

Reluctant Dragon (44-85599) Dyess AFB, Texas. 96th BG. Texas Museum of Military History. Former Drone DB-17P. Formerly displayed in City Park.

Return to Glory (44-6393) March ARB, California. 97th BG. Used by Lt. Gen. Ira Eaker at Bolling Field as VB-17. Rescued U.S. Embassy staff at Nanking, China. Former 'Starduster' for Genral Eaker. New name 'Return to Glory'.

Shoo Shoo Shoo Baby (42-32076) Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio. 91st BG. USAF Museum/DRC. Interned in Sweden on 23rd combat mission. Restored and flown to Wright-Patterson AFB first display site. Moving to National Air & Space Museum

Short Bier (44-83663) Hill AFB, Utah. 493rd BG. Hill Aerospace Museum.

Sleepy Time Gal (44-83624) Dover AFB, Delaware. 381st BG. USAF Museum/DRC. Former DB-17P drone controller and was designated as MB-17G for missile tests. Displayed with cutaway ball turret. May have been last B17 to drop bombs for the USAF.

Virgin's Delight (43-38635) Castle AFB, California. 94th BG. Castle Air Museum. Former test bed for All-Weather electronic gear.

Yankee Doodle II (44-83884) Barksdale AFH, Louisiana. 303 BG, 8th AF. 8th Air Force Museum. Named for Gen. Ira Eaker who led first B-17 combat mission on original Yankee Doodle. Trucked to airbase.

Under Restoration

(No name) (41-9210) Payne Field, WA. Flying Heritage Collection. Paul Allen picked up from Whittington

(No name) (44-83790) Remote area. N/A. Liberty Foundation. Belly landing in Dec. 1947 on Dyke Lake, Labrador, Canada. Broken aircraft.

Champaign Lady (44-85813) N/A. 401th BG. Shiffer Family. Being built from parts of three aircraft.

City of Savannah (44-83814) Pooler, GA. 388 BG. Mighty Eighth A.F. Museum. Used for air survey in Canada, returned to U.S. as air tanker for Black Hills Aviation then swapped to NASM Mighty Eighth A.F. Museum. Complete aircraft. Now owned by MEM.

Desert Rat (41-2595) Marengo, IL. 97th BG in U.S.. Mike Kellner. Only still existing XC-108A, flew over the 'hump' in WW II

Memphis Belle (41-24485) WPAFB National Museum USAF. 91st BG, Olive Drab paint. Memphis Belle Memorial Assn, Inc.. First B-17 to complete 25 ETO combat missions and return to U.S. for war bond tour. Named for Miss Margaret Polk by Lt. Robert Morgan.

My Gal Sal (41-9032) Blue Ash Airport, Cincinnati, OH. Camouflage top/Gray underside. Ultimate Sacrifice. Ditched on Greenland icecap while being ferried to England. Damaged by high winds during the 53 years on the icecap. Part of the 97th BG.

Piccadilly Lilly (44-83387) Los Angeles, CA. 918th BG. Calif. Air Heritage Foundation. Aircraft that started the B17 movement in movies starting with Gregory Peck in 1947 then used in the 1963 TV series.

Piccadilly Lilly II (44-83684) Chino, CA. 91st BG. Planes of Fame Museum.

Suzy Q (44-83525) Polk City, FL. unknown. Fantasy of Flight. Damaged by 1992 hurricane Andrew. Sent to Kissimmee for restoration. Now back at Polk City.

Swamp Ghost (41-2446) Aggiambo Swamp, Papua, New Guinea. 7th & 19th BG's. Unknown. Combat damage forced ditching in swamp 2/23/42.

Swoose (40-3097) WPAFB National Museum USAF. 11th BG. Museum USAF. Makeshift damage repair in Pacific led to the name (half swan, half goose) from WWII song. Used by Gen. George Brett. 11th & 19th BG's.

For the World War II B-17 veteran, it will be a touch of pride when he tells his loved ones at the Mighty Eighth Museum flew in a B-17 and I helped restore this one." ... and time is running out, witness the news from the Tennessee Chapter of the 8th Air Force Association — "We're shutting down" ... in journalism, "names make news," and the January FLAK NEWS was right in there with 118 names, plus an additional 1,449 on the annual Taps list ... one of our fellow B-17 bomb group associations, the 401st, was happy to have had a "Succession Plan" in place when their president died suddenly; our presidents, **Bill Comstock** and Wally Blackwell, looked ahead long ago and the 398th is "in place" with no less than 50% of the leadership coming from the second generation ... likewise in England, where the early-on Friends like David Wells, Tony Clark, Tony Barker, Eunice Fox and others have gone on, newcomers like *Peter Brooke*. Russ Abbey, Malcolm Osborn, Dominic Pike and others are "in place" to carry on "over there" ... the 91st Bomb Group prints its "Ragged Irregular" (like FLAK NEWS), but can also be had "online" for the computer disciples ... A-2 jackets were seen everywhere at Station 131, but did anyone ever see Col. Hunter in anything but Class A's? ... maybe that's because he was a West Pointer, and a stickler for military discipline (which he enforced through the Group Exec, Col. Gertrud Peifer, the grand daughter of the German lady into whose home Federico Gonzales was taken when his plane was downed in Neuss in 1945, died last year, according to local historian Alfred Wilms, (and interpreter Lore Pfefferkorn) ... they also send greetings from *Manfred Konig*, the man who brought the 398th tour party to Neuss in 1988 and 1992 ... he's the only one left of his 600 crew, but pilot Ike Alhadeff found seven other Seattlearea 398th friends to help him celebrate his 94th birthday at a luncheon (and he even picked up the tab) ... Bernard Kuse says don't miss the Buckhorn Saloon for a great dinner during the reunion in Denver ... did you know that Yankee great Yogi Berra was in on the Normandy landings? He manned a machine gun aboard the USS Bayfield ... the Mighty Eighth Museum will offer (next January) a three-day "Mission Adventure" that will conclude with a 90-minute ride in the recently restored B-17, Liberty Belle ... your Editor loves to receive letters, but not those that come with "Address Unknown," "Fee Due 50c," "Return To Sender," "Deceased," "No Forwarding Address," etc. ... it should come as no surprise that the Air Force would entrust an all-female crew (Page 7) to deliver costly cargo on a C-5 when you consider that God entrusted women to deliver His priceless children ... the chairman of the new Museum at Station 131, Andrew Grisbrooke, and his wife, Christine, breed and train Siberian Huskies at their home near the Woodman Inn ... things are really humming along on 398th.org ... webmaster Dave Jordan reports that the site has had over 3/4 million visits, with the "Fortress" story still very popular world wide with 128,000 hits last winter ... a San Diego area weekly, called *The Paper*, published the entire story as a special World War II feature, and it drew a flurry of calls and comments ... yes, there really was a B-17 H, like the RAF Lancaster that dropped a boat to the Pinner crew after their ditching ... the Boeing B-17 tech manuals make it all look so easy, but in reality ditching represents "minutes and seconds of terror" ...
