

On June 13, 2017, our own Richard L. Martin was presented with the French Legion of Honor Medal at VFW Post 1152 in Kokomo, Indiana. Newspaper press and a news crew from WTHR, an NBC affiliate in Indianapolis, were there to record it all. This soundbite was pulled from the interview conducted by WTHR reporter Emily Longnecker: *"This had made my heart full today," Martin said, speaking in front of everyone gathered. "It's something I've never dreamed of when you're in the service, but it does happen and I'm proof of that."*

Legion of Honor Ceremony Richard L. Martin – Kokomo, Indiana June 13th, 2017

Remarks by Frédéric Cholé Deputy Consul general of France in Chicago

Dear State, County and City Representatives, Dear Veterans organizations Commanders and members, Dear Mr. Martin, Dear Family and friends, Honored veterans and everyone gathered here today,

It is a great honor and privilege to be with you in Kokomo to pay tribute to Mr. Richard Martin, a brave man who was ready to sacrifice his life for France and Western Europe during the Second World War.

I also would like to dedicate this special acknowledgment to all the American soldiers who, like you Mr. Martin, embarked on the difficult and dangerous journey to free a whole continent from intolerance, violence and the tyranny of fascism.

As we are commemorating this year the Centenary of the entry of the U.S into WWI, we also have to remember all those who, a generation earlier, came to save Europe.

But today, we are gathered to pay tribute to Mr. Martin and all the young Americans, who, 73 years ago, put their ideals, their might and their courage to the service of democracy and the dignity of humankind.

From June 6, 1944, they fought bravely, battle after battle, across France and beyond, and like Mr. Martin, they witnessed the worst of the war. Many did not return but they are in our hearts and fortunately, Mr. Martin is here to help us remember.

Twice last century, in 1917 and 1944, American soldiers restored freedom to my country, France. The French people will never forget what they owe America, our steadfast friend, partner and ally. From Lafayette and Yorktown during the American Revolution, to the battlefields of World War I, and the shores of Normandy, our two countries have always stood shoulder-to-shoulder to defend and promote the values of freedom and democracy that are the core of who we are.

On June 6th, 1944, the D-Day landing changed the course of the history of humanity. Victory was still far off and there was much suffering to come. But hope was alive again, at last.

Today, it is that same hope, that same ideal that we owe to those men whom we shall never, can never, forget. To the French people, all veterans are heroes. Their engagement is an example, an obligation for us and for future generations.

There can be no future without memory. The torch they carried so high and so far, the torch of freedom, of dignity, of justice and democracy, still lights our way.

Faced with the uncertainties of a changing world, let us strive to remain loyal to the legacy, the sacrifice and the values of the heroes who liberated France and Western Europe.

The French Legion of Honor shows France's eternal gratitude to all the Veterans and Mr. Richard Martin deserves this prestigious decoration.

Sergeant Martin, you entered active duty in November 1942 at age 20. From November 1944 until May 1945, you participated in four major campaigns: Air Offensive Europe, The Ardennes, the Rhineland and Central Europe.

You were assigned to the 398th Bomb Group of the U.S Air Force where you were an engineer gunner on B-17 Flying Fortresses. Sergeant Martin, you completed a total of 35 combat missions.

In France, you targeted enemy installations and strategic points like cross roads, rail yards and bridges in particular near Metz in the Moselle area, near the German border, where the fighting was raging.

For the excellence of your service during the war, you have received prestigious awards including the Air Medal with 4 Oak Leaf Clusters.

Thank you for your service, Sir.

I think you deserve a big applause.

Thanks to your courage, to France's American friends and allies, France has been living in peace for seven decades –the longest period of continuous peace in modern French history.

Dear Mr. Martin,

In recognition of your heroic actions, and to show his gratitude, the President of the French Republic nominated you to the Legion of Honor. Created by Napoleon Bonaparte in 1802, it is the highest honor that France can bestow upon those who have achieved remarkable deeds for France.

I could not be more honored to present the Legion of Honor medal to you today.

So from the bottom of my heart: Thank you.

Now, I will continue in French.

Mr. Martin, au nom du Président de la République Française, je vous fais Chevalier de la Légion d'honneur.

WWII Vet Still Carries Sharp Memories of Time Aboard B-17

Lou Stoffer was on hand at the Olympia Regional Airport and Olympic Flight Museum last May and told his firsthand WWII accounts to visitors who came to see and fly in The Aluminum Overcast, one of the few restored B-17's still flying today.

Lou, an Engineer/Top Turret Gunner with the Grinter Crew, was joined by another one of our 398th veterans, Fred Parker, who was Tail Gunner on the Ballard Crew. Both men were in the 600th Squadron. They relayed their tales to the curious crowds who came out to see the impressive piece of military history up close and personal.

Lou, Fred and members of the The Aluminum Overcast's crew were all on hand in order to help communicate what it was like to fly on a bomb loaded B-17 over Europe during wartime.

During his time aboard a B-17 Flying Fortress, Lou Stoffer managed to survive attacks from Nazi fighter planes and a headlong crash into a dense forest that caused his airplane to erupt in a bomb-laden fireball. Still, he says the scariest part of his run in the 398th Bomb Group was flying through clouds of exploding shrapnel, commonly known as flak, that was launched 6 miles in the air by German ground forces in an effort to tear apart metal and flesh alike.

"I don't know how the pilot put up with all that flak all around us and just missing us," said Stoffer, 92, of Centralia, Washington.

Stoffer was just 19 years old when he was drafted into military service toward the end of World War II. While 73 years have flown by in the interim, he still remembers the harrowing experiences like they happened yesterday.

"When we first got over there the pilot fell off his bicycle and broke his arm and we flew with another pilot for five missions," recalled Stoffer. "On his next mission that pilot was shot down and the whole crew got killed. We really lucked there."

Stoffer served from July 1943 until October 1945 and logged missions in a number of different airplanes during that time. Of course, those changes were made out of necessity rather than convenience once his crew's first plane crashed when it stalled shortly after takeoff.

"We were taking off with a full bomb load and a full gas load and crashed into an oak forest. It killed two guys [S/Sgt. David Flores, Navigator Trainee and 2nd Lt. Francis Harrod, Navigator] and sent two of us to the hospital including me and the co-pilot [1st Lt. James L. White]," said Stoffer. "It was all on fire when we came down."

Stoffer said that he suffered a separated shoulder during the crash and was the last one out of the burning plane. Moments after he made his exit under the help of his fellow crewmembers who had returned for him, the airplane erupted in a ferocious ball of flame that tore through the forest.

"The people who lived around the airport [Station 131] were amazed that anybody survived it because by the time I got into the ambulance the whole plane blew up," said Stoffer.



This is all that was left of Grinter's B-17 *"Here's Hopin"* after it crashed on take-off December 24, 1944 (the photo above was taken the next day). In his Timeless Voices interview on www.398th.org, Lou recalled the crash; "We dropped into a bank at the end of the runway losing our gear, bounced into the air, pancaking into the Gypsy Farm Oak Forest, plowing into large trees like they were mere matchsticks. We were on fire after the first bump."

Thanks to a keen eye and some resourcefulness, many of Stoffer's memories are well catalogued in a photo album. That album has been cobbled together with photos he took or accumulated during his service time. The photographs that he took himself were captured via a 35 millimeter black and white camera using bootleg film.

He says that the guns on the bombers were affixed with cameras, and when the roll of film got low, down to about 10 feet or so, the tail end would simply be chopped off so a new roll could be installed.

Somewhere along the way an enterprising film monger realized that those cuttings could be packaged and resold to the enlisted men for personal use. It was a resource that Stoffer utilized well in capturing rare scenes of B-17s flying in formation amid exploding shrapnel, trucks full of German POWs and a bird's eye views of German targets in the moments prior to, during and after the mass bombings delivered by a formation of B-17 Flying Fortresses.

The 8thAFHS does *not* need your squadron. **Remit by mail with check or money order payable to** <u>Armed Forces Reunions</u> by September 7, 2018. You may also register and pay by credit card online at: <u>http://www.8thafhs.org/new/reunions.php</u> A 3.5% convenience fee will be added to credit card reservations. *Forms received <u>after</u> September 7 will be accepted on a space available basis only.* Hotel reservations should also be made by September 7, but we encourage you to do so much sooner.

For attendees canceling reunion activities prior to the cut-off date, Armed Forces Reunions, Inc. (AFR) shall process a full refund less a \$10 per person processing fee. DAYTON CITY TOUR

Thursday, October 11

The birthplace of aviation, Dayton was once home to powered flight inventors, Orville and Wilbur Wright. Your guide will narrate the significance of the many interesting sites along this tour, including Oregon District, the city's oldest suburb; the Civil War Monument; the Flyover, an award-winning sculpture of flight; the Korean War State Memorial: and Memorial Hall, where veterans are remembered. Learn the history of the Miami Valley from the first settlers in 1796 to the influence of such entrepreneurs as Patterson, Deeds, Kettering, and Fraze. These notables and others made immense contributions to aviation, the arts, sports, government, and industry. There will be a short stop at the Esther Price Candy Store, now a successful candy distributor, which opened 50 years ago in Mrs. Price's basement. Enjoy lunch on your own at Dayton's upscale shopping and restaurant district, The Greene - featuring Cheesecake Factory, Chipotle, Panera, Subway, and many other dining choices.

THURSDAY EVENING BUFFET

Thursday, October 12

A special showing of "The Cold Blue", a documentary by Peter Hankoff and Erik Nelson featuring several 8th Air Force veterans. In 1943, William Wyler, one of Hollywood's most renowned and versatile directors, went to Europe to document the Air War in progress. Wyler flew actual combat missions with B-17's --- and one of his three cinematographers was killed during filming. Incredibly, all of the raw color footage Wyler shot for the "Memphis Belle" was recently discovered deep in the vaults of the National Archives, and a new film has been constructed out of the material. "The Cold Blue" is a meditation on youth, war and trauma, and stands as a tribute to one of the world's great filmmakers, and the men of the 8th Air Force who flew mission after suicidal mission in the Second World War. Nine of the very few surviving veterans were interviewed in the summer of 2017, and their voices take us through the harrowing world that Wyler and his cameramen captured in that summer of 1943.

NATIONAL MUSEUM OF THE US AIR FORCE

Friday, October 12

The United States Air Force Museum at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base is the oldest and largest military aviation museum in the world. The Museum tells the exciting story of aviation development from the days of the Wright brothers at Kitty Hawk to the Space Age. More than ten galleries showcase various exhibits including over 300 aircraft and missiles, plus historically interesting aeronautical displays. Exhibits are known to change and move, but lots of planes are on display, such as the P-51, P-47, P-38, B-24, and B-26. The newly refurbished B-17 Memphis Bell, one of the most recognizable symbols of WWII will be on permanent display at the museum. In addition, the Presidential Gallery is located here featuring a collection of presidential aircraft, some of which you can walk through. The museum also features an IMAX theater and flight simulators (admission on your own). Have lunch at your leisure in one of the cafes on the mezzanine or second floor. The buses will shuttle back to the hotel at 12 noon, 1pm, and 2:15pm.

CARILLON HISTORICAL PARK / PACKARD MUSEUM Saturday, October 13

Carillon Historical Park celebrates the history of invention, transportation, and pioneer life in Dayton and the Miami Valley. It is home to a variety of collections, which document the area's history. While touring the Park, you may visit Newcom Tavern, Dayton's oldest standing building; view the Wright Flyer III; and board a 1903 Barney & Smith Parlor car. Antique automobiles, a working 1930's Print Shop, and vintage bicycles are some of the other exhibits you will see along the way. Continue the tour and step back in time at America's Packard Museum, where the Packard Motor Car Company comes to life again. Located in the original Packard Dealership Building, which was built in 1917, the museum has officially taken the name of the original dealership - The Citizens Motorcar Company - but has become known as "America's Packard Museum." View the world's largest collection of "Packard only" automobiles in the actual showroom. This unique museum showcases "the world's finest motor car" from its beginnings in 1899 to its demise in 1956.

Note: This tour may be limited to the first 100 people, or different schedules may be followed. A lunch break is not included on this tour, so consider pre-purchasing the box lunch to eatbefore departure.

Aside from dangerous takeoffs, explosive cargo, piercing shrapnel and enemy fighter planes, personnel aboard a B-17 had to fight the cold. Flying 6 miles high in an open airplane, Stoffer says the temperature would drop to at least minus 50 degrees F at times.

"The problem with that is that's as low as the thermometer went so it could have been colder," explained Stoffer. He noted that the flight crews were equipped with electric suits in order to keep warm. "You had to have those or you would freeze to death."

Stoffer is a natural storyteller and has quite obviously never shied away from rehashing a good tale for an eager listener. He says he enjoys the opportunity to bring old stories to life for people whenever he can and considers visits from one of the few B-17s that is still able to go airborne as good an opportunity as any to go tripping down memory lane.

"My grandkids all like to show up. They kind of like going there when I'm there and listening to what's going on," said Stoffer, who believes that the firsthand accounts help to make the experience more real for visitors who are trying to get a feel for what life aboard a B-17 in full service was like.

When Stoffer returned home to the Hub City he went straight to work in the family business for Stoffer and Sons Sheet Metal. His father founded the business in 1932. Today he owns the company and his son handles the day-to-day operations.

"I arrived in Centralia the day the war ended in Germany. They closed up all the bars and liquor stores in the city for some odd reason," remembered Stoffer. Lou doesn't drink himself but admitted to helping a fellow serviceman from the 398th find his way to a celebratory bottle on that momentous day.

Stoffer admits that to this day he often goes back to his photo album or sits down to watch a showing of "Memphis Belle," the 1990 Hollywood rendition of life in the tightknit B-17 contingent.

"It does affect you. Really. We lost 293 guys from the 398th," said Stoffer, who flew a full slate of 35 missions before he was sent back home to Centralia. "My only mission that was a milk run, with no flak and no fighters, was my last mission."

We thank Jordan Nailon for giving his permission to use excerpts from his article in The Chronicle about Lou. Jordan wrote that he has "a deep well of admiration and respect for the men who undertook those missions in their flying fortresses". He also said he would be honored if we mentioned his grandfather in the Flak News. We are proud to do so.

Walter Nailon flew 25 missions as an Engineer / Top Turret Gunner with the 96th BG, 338 SQ on a B-17 named "Lucky Lady". He flew his missions from May 4, 1943 to September 16, 1943. That included the August 17 mission to Regensburg, Germany, the first shuttle mission of the war.


